



Our first stop was the Big Texan in Amarillo, Texas, which we used as a planned rest stop so we could take a little more time exploring the buildings inside & out. From there we went straight to Cadillac Ranch where we played around the cars for a while then back on the road for our next adventure.

We finally made it to Midpoint Café but not in time for dinner. Since they were closed when we got there we decided to hang out and take some pictures. It was getting late and we were hungry, so we hopped onto the I-40 in search of food when we came across a Stucky's. While we were eating the waitress told us about its historic nature on Route 66, and later on in the evening we did find it in one of the books.

While on Route 66 we kept seeing sign for Clines Corners and how it's a "Must See" place to stop, so we stopped. Clines Corners sits on Route 66 and was originally built in 1934 and rebuilt in 1937 when they made Route 66, and is 50 miles from any major city in all directions. Not to mention it's also where most of our money went. After filling up at their vintage gas station we rolled back onto Route 66 for more exploring and sight seeing. We spent the night in Tucumcari, New Mexico where we saw an old car yard, and many of the buildings on 66 still had their neon signs working. We didn't get any pictures because "Yup!" I forgot the camera again.

Thursday morning as we were heading out we realized that we had more on our list than we had time for. From the car we did see the Giant Dinosaurs and the Tee Pee hotel, along with lots & lots of old abandoned buildings and gas stations. Our last overnight stay was in Flagstaff, Arizona, which was also my favorite part of the trip. After our police escort to the Travelers Inn where we stayed, Sean and I set out on foot to explore Route 66 and get some exercise, where we came across the Galaxy Diner. Now this was one old retro place! With most of its original furniture and neon signs inside and out, this was one popular place. Live music while you ate and a Hollywood wall with pictures of all the stars who visited there. Ok, camera was forgotten again but Sean ran back to get it since we were very close to the hotel.

Friday we set off for Glendale and came across a gas station that had a car spa, and all of the detailers were from Maguires and only used the products from the company. We're almost home now, but just had to make one last stop in Yucca, a town completely devoted to welcoming Aliens from other planets. They even had a Yucca Valley Alien Hotel with their sign being a spaceship; you could definetly tell that this town was on its way to being another ghost town. Like some of those Route 66 motel beds, June's Barrett-Jackson Orange County Auction was infested with bugs. Volkswagen bugs. Beetles, vans and Thing's were present in what seemed to be a disproportionate number compared to Mustangs, Camaros and the other usual subjects.

Barrrett-Jackson Auctions truly are Events and the Orange County Fairgrounds was an apt site to contain it all. Display barns full of vehicles awaiting auction; drifting exhibitions; major manufacturer exhibits with ride/drive-alongs in their latest and greatest models. And a vendor mall fine-tuned for Car Guys/Gals.



Then there was the Auction Arena: colorful, noisy and fast-paced, and short on seating for the average Joe and Jane. SRO with crowds continually drifting through the area. It was interesting watching the Auction Assistants work the bidders and stir up excitement among groups of people gathered along the runway. If you owned a gas station 50-60 years ago, you're going to kick yourself for not saving every sign, water can, etc. Memorabilia (in very good condition) was moved at unbelievable prices.



The star of the show was an early 60's VW bus that topped all other sales at \$217,800. Drab green and rather common. I walked by it three or four times in the display barn and still can't figure out its magic other than what must have been an exceptional restoration job.



The grandstand is on the inner part of the turn. However I did have the thrill of seeing Button pass Vettel in "my" corner in the last lap. So that made it a 10 of 10 for the day. It's not likely to happen again so NEXT YEAR I will be in the hairpin. No one has passed Vettel all year so it was astounding to see that and the crowd roared and came to their feet. It wasn't that we liked or disliked a driver but it was the quality of the drive that we applauded.

Another cool thing of being there is seeing the support races. Seeing 30 identical, new Ferraris in the challenge race for not-so-professional drivers banging fenders, a Porsche race and a 1600 formula race with 5 cars swaping leads was a good build up for the F1 race.

I watched the race I had recorded and it was really a thrill to hear Jensen Button say when he was running behind Vettel, "I think I can win this." Then he did in great fashion driving the race of his life. I hope the F1 comes together for Austin, Texas in 2012. I am there and for sure I am back to Montreal. I made my reservations.

Sue Hinkle handles the ordering. Badge request forms are available at the Regalia table at monthly meetings and on the club's web site. All orders must be prepaid.


