The event started at Mazda of Escondido, where Sloan (Laurie Waid), Cameron - complete with cigar (Steve Waid) – and, Ferris (Gene Streeter), greeted us.

Thanks to Mazda for their hospitality and for donating coffee, bagels, pastries, and juice while Ferris reviewed the various responses to why we were off work for the day. The winning excuse by Wally Stevens was that he was pinned to the table in his acupuncture session and could not get up to get to work. For his effort, he won an apple with a worm in it.

About 9:00 the rain had stopped, and 35 cars departed. Ferris told us to stay close together as we were going through several traffic lights and major gaps "just were not going to work," So, not wanting to take the freeway, we went southwest on Del Dios Highway and onto S6 to see the gorgeous homes of Rancho Santa Fe with their lush landscaping and fancy gates. Passing the Del Mar Horse Park we were wondering just WHERE are we going? Into Sorrento Valley and pass San Diego Motorsports and the

Penasquitos Canyon Preserve and into a commercial district had us convinced we had no idea where we'd end up.

About 10:15, to our delight, we arrived at Ferrari & Maserati's Service & Restoration Facility. We wandered around the service bay and restoration areas where we ooo'd and ahh'd the cars. One was a Ferrari costing \$335,000. I think it had a retractable hardtop and generated 557 hp. My favorite was a

wine-colored Maserati Quattroporte sedan with a dove-colored leather interior and a twin-turbo V8 at only about \$150,000. It was not nearly so flashy but oh, so pretty. Our hostess Elizabeth Ducet even started one of the Ferraris so we could appreciate the strong engine sound (not at all like a Miata). By the time we left the facility about an hour later, we had blue skies and the Miata tops came down.

We high-tailed it back to North County using I-805 and I-5 and exited at Palomar Airport Road. We were convinced we were going to either the Carlsbad Flower Fields or the Karl Strauss Brewery for a tour and lunch. But no, we passed by both of them and continued on to the World Headquarters of the Gemological Institute of America (GIA). Because our appointment was for 12:15, we were about 30 minutes early, so we walked down the sidewalk and enjoyed the view of the Carlsbad flowers, windmill and ocean. When the time arrived, we went back to GIA, where security is TIGHT. We had to show personal ID, and the guard noted our license plate numbers. Once inside, we were treated to a lovely lunch of salad, lasagna, garlic bread, pulled pork, rigatoni noodles and cookies. Turns out GIA thought 35 PEOPLE would be coming, not 35 cars, but they did a very graceful recovery. We had a self-guided tour of the exhibits where we saw the famous jewelencrusted bras where there was discussion about its size (an A or T cup, neither of which would be

comfortable.) We also saw an elaborate ivory statue, huge quartz crystals, and lots of gemstones. GIA is the headquarters for grading gems, has various gemology courses in identification and grading gemstones, and a jewelry design program. They are known and respected worldwide. To my surprise, we didn't see very many diamonds, but lots of topaz, rubies, sapphires, tanzanite and other unfamiliar gemstones.

We left there about 2:30 for our third destination by driving down the road a small way to the Museum of Making Music. Here we had a wonderful guided tour of music through time, starting with marches of Sousa, and progressing through ragtime, jazz, swing, rock n roll, rock, and the electrical noise of today. In each display we heard samples of the music and learned how it affected later music. We also saw the evolution of musical instruments including a real player piano, a display of various types of saxophones, and guitars. We were encouraged to play some instruments, and Kari Streeter took advantage of that offer to play Chariots of Fire on a clavinova. And the final exhibit was a display of various banjos.

About 3:40, we headed home, having had a wonderful day of fancy cars, expensive jewels, and wonderful music. Thanks to Ferris for the event. We're looking forward to next year!

March Field Air Museum

On March 20, 2014, Daryled and Carlan Brystol led 13 Miatas and two OTMs from our familiar starting point at Deer Springs Road north a little over 50 miles on the I-15 and I-215 to the Van Buren exit off the I-215. This is where the March Field Air Museum is located on the old March Air Force Base. The museum is easily recognized by the orange and white checkerboard hanger situated right by the I-215 freeway. You probably have driven by it many

times and didn't realize what it was.

The museum was born in 1979 and opened to the public in 1980. At opening for the public, the museum had 3 aircraft on display. Now, the museum has over 70 aircraft parked near the I-215 for public viewing. You can wander among these vintage aircraft by yourself, with your friends, or you can sign up for a guided tour depending on docent availability.

Old aircraft are a lot like old cars, I suppose. They either interest you or you would rather do something else for entertainment. However, the aircraft displayed at the March Field Air Museum played significant roles in our country's history. Many of these aircraft fought the battles of our World Wars and, in the case of the B-29, brought WWII to an end. It was on August 6, 1945 that Colonel Paul Tibbets, of the Army Air Corp, piloted his B-29 toward the center of Hiroshima, the site of an important Japanese army Headquarters. Colonel Tibbets released the atomic bomb known as Little Boy from 31,000 feet. At 1900 feet above the target, the atomic bomb exploded and turned Hiroshima into nothing but scorched earth. Shortly thereafter, the Japanese surrendered. It was really amazing to see a B-29 up close, and personal.

But whether airplanes and helicopters interest you or not, you have to appreciate that these flying machines were built in the interest of security of our nation. Many of the WWII aircraft, especially the B-17s were hand built by a civilian work force that included both men and women. Jan's mother worked in Long Beach during the 2nd World War building B-17s. She was one of the original "Rosie the Riveters."

Some of the most interesting aircraft displayed at the Museum include the above-mentioned B-17 Flying Fortress. You may recall this aircraft in the movie "Twelve O'clock High. Then there is the B-25 Mitchell which Jimmy Doolittle and his men flew from the aircraft carrier USS Hornet to bomb Japan.

There was a movie made about Doolittle's raiders titled "Thirty Seconds Over Tokyo."

There were aircraft on display representing the Korean Conflict, including the F-86 Sabre Jet and the MiG-15. Though the Sabre Jet was similar to the Mig in appearance and performance, our highly trained American fighter pilots flying the F-86 dominated the skies over Korea.

The Museum has a collection of enemy aircraft from the Vietnam conflict as well. These include the Mig-17, Mig-19, and Mig-21. It was the downing of 5 Mig aircraft in the Vietnam War that earned Randy Cunningham and his Radar Intercept Officer Willie Driscol. the titles of "Ace."

Another aircraft that had to catch your attention should have been the B-52. That huge, eight-engine bomber was designed as a strategic nuclear bomber in the 50s and was later used to deliver conventional bombs in Vietnam. Each of these aircraft could carry one hundred 500 lb bombs by combining the bomb bay capacity with external bomb racks on the wings. It was a fearsome weapon during the Vietnam conflict. The B-52 parked at the Museum actually flew 175 combat missions in the Vietnam War.

If you are interested in historic aircraft, you could wander for hours among the rare aircraft displayed in the March Museum site. I believe something that most people never think about is these complex, high performance aircraft were flown by young men (and now women as well) who were really just kids. I was just 24 years old when I began flying the F-4 Phantom. At that time it was the combat aircraft that held nearly all speed and time-to-climb records in the world. Daryled was a helicopter crewman and gunner flying Combat Search and Rescue missions. I think Daryled was even younger than me at the time. Essentially all the aircrews, no matter what aircraft they flew, were very young. I guess it's a lot like Formula One racing – a young person's sport indeed. If you're old enough to know better, you're too old. There is a famous saying that has been around the aviation community since the early days of aviation:

"There are old pilots and there are bold pilots, but there are no old bold pilots."

The museum had many exhibits housed in the hangers such as aircraft engines, missiles and bombs and even a cut-away cockpit from a B-47 strategic bomber. There were displays of uniforms and flight gear. There is even a flight simulator that visitors can try their hand at flying a plane.

The museum turned out to be much bigger than any of us expected. There were many displays that were missed by some. You would have to go back another day to see all you missed. I know I'm going back, and I've been there twice.

Following the tour of the March Field Air Museum we all headed back down the freeway and stopped for lunch in Murrieta at Richie's Diner. The restaurant was prepared for our arrival and had reserved a special room for our party. Everyone thought the food was great and the price was very reasonable. Steve Waid consumed both a Malt AND a Milk Shake (Oops, Sorry Steve. Did you forget to tell Laurie?) Got to remember Richie's next time we head north on the freeway.

This was a different kind of run for the Club. There were no twisties to challenge us – just a follow the leader up the freeway. The destination was superior to the drive this time.

To kick things off, Laurie Waid presented President Neal Mills with a green Miata sweatshirt as a thanks for his efforts over the past year.

Membership – Chris and Linda reported that in 2013 we had 168 memberships which dropped to 100 in January and is now at 147 representing 168 Miatas. There are 43 MAs, 73 NBs, and 42 NCs.

Events – Jeff Frederick reported that we had 79 events in 2013 consisting of monthly meetings, impromptu runs, parades, formal runs, air shows, tech days, and miscellaneous events. That's a LOT. We had 3 events put on by first-timers who earned

their magnetics. His goal now is to have more new people present events and earn their magnetics. He also asked everyone to USE THE CALENDAR ON THE WEBSITE FOR DETAILS ON THE EVENTS. Jan works very hard to keep it up to date and accurate.

Twists N Turns – No one from the newsletter team was present, but Neal pointed out that they are trying to get the newsletter out earlier in the month. He also reported that they missed one month of publication because there was only one article submitted. He encouraged everyone to contribute to the newsletter.

Treasurer – Laurie Waid reported that in April 2013, we had \$11,515.30 in the bank. As of March 31,

2014, we had \$14,476.65. Biggest expenses were newsletter and mailing, Holiday Party, and Club Picnic but these were planned expenses and are the benefits of membership. Income came from dues, opportunity drawings, Mark's photo sale to Mazda, and Regalia \$700 profit. She also said \$1500 has been set aside for Surf 'N' Safari 2015.

Election of Officers – The current board was re-elected with Neal Mills as President, Christy Pluciennik as Vice President, Rainer Mueller as Secretary and Laurie Waid as Treasurer.

ByLaws Change – Neal explained the two proposed changes to our bylaws and the reasons for the change. Change 1 was to change the Annual Meeting date from April to November which is more in line with our fiscal year and makes for an easier transition. The second change was to make the officers' terms from Jan 1 to Dec. 31 of the same year to be in line with change 1. These changes were passed 28 to 1.

Neal indicated as a result of these changes, there would be another Election of Officers in November and that he did not intend to run again as he felt we needed some "new blood" in the Presidential seat. Surf 'N' Safari 2014 – Christy Pluciennik and Rainer

Mueller presented a slide show of Surf'N' Safari 2004 to show newcomers to the club was it was like to host this 3-day Miata party. They are working to select a location and offered for consideration the Spring Hill Suites (a new Marriott hotel in Oceanside near the pier) as an excellent location due to being close to the surf, sunsets, having reasonable prices, and being new. One drawback is having only valet parking unless we use a nearby parking garage. Someone suggested having the location farther south in San Diego proper but pricing may be prohibitive. Rainer and Christy are looking at alternative locations. They asked the members if they wanted to do a Surf'N' 2015 event and would volunteer to put it on. The members voted a strong YES. A committee will be formed to plan the event. Gene Streeter and Rosi Romero then presented the 2013 Grammy Awards, an event which garnered itself its own article.

Steve and Laurie Waid raffled off three tote bags from Regalia. Diane Foster, Todd and Christy Pluciennik, and Rosie Romero were the winners. The meeting was closed and we all enjoyed the club's birthday cake. Afterwards some members went to the grassy section outside the Auto Museum for a picnic lunch.
