With an intimate venue, great food, lots of out of town guests and good weather, we had a four day Miata Party recognized by nationwide guests to be the best there was.

Because the aftermarket Miata accessories scene was very hot at the time, we had a significant vendor "jungle" that included Moss Motors, Flyin Miata, Crazy Red etc. Many of us got great deals on parts and accessories. We also had numerous runs and group activities to participate in based on your preferences: short driving events, all day driving events, a welcome reception, a trip to the Wild Animal Park (Safari) and a luau on the beach in Coronado (Surf).

Bill Wilner, VP of SoCalm wrote in Twists and Turns, Nov. 1999: "Congratulations to SDMC on their first production of this scale (read: awesome!). The events were so well planned and all ran seamlessly; the runs to the forest-village of Julian and around the orchards and wine country of Ramona were spectacular. The Friday night Luau on Coronado Island was a relief from the heat inland. There were so many great vendors to shop with and get installs from in one place. There were cool freebies like a canvas deck bag with a copy of the 5th anniversary Miata book for every registrant; the food was all terrific — and there was plenty for everyone! The raffle prizes —it seemed like everyone won something (I know I did). The attention to detail was amazing: even the graphics on all the handouts were stunning!"

We are now in the process of planning Surf N Safari 2015 – with Christy Pluchennik as chairman and the Board working as her committee to get started. We have selected a beautiful venue right on the beach at Carlsbad, the Hilton Garden Inn, which will give us a great venue with open spaces and plenty of parking, as well as a ballroom for our Saturday party. We will soon be seeking members to assist us in various areas of the event: The Fun Team (driving events), Hospitality, Sponsors, etc. We will be sharing more on that in the next few months. The early planning of date and venue allows our guests from all over to plan their trips far enough in advance to be workable. We currently expect guests from Canada, New England and South Carolina.

Stay tuned for more information about this fabulous adventure called Surf 'N' Safari. Registration will open September 15th on our website, and hotel reservations will be available. Of course, you can always sleep at home if you live nearby, but the camaraderie and intimacy of the whole package is being on a "stay-cation" with fellow Miata friends as much as possible. September is shaping up to be a very active month.

The month starts with Miatas at Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca (MRLS). Over 1,600 cars are expected at MRLS to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the car we all love and the unveiling of its next generation, the ND. SDMC will be represented with more than 60 cars and over 100 people. It appears SDMC will have the single largest contingent at the event. Not all are SDMC members. Some are friends of members and one couple is flying in from Rio de Janeiro, Brazil to join with us. Mark Booth has been talking this event up for months and he sure has got results. If you're going, pack plenty of patience. With an expected crowd of over 2,500 people everyone will need patience and a smile – but I expect it to be worth it.

In mid-September, Mark Booth is leading a group along Route 66. This is a rerun of an event he did a couple of years ago. Starting in Chicago, the group will meander for 2 weeks back to the west coast along the mother road stopping at innumerable souvenir stores, museums, old gas stations, diners, and hotels along the way. On September 13, Dawn Coats will lead the *Scared Twistless Run*. It includes a run, food, and a play. Dawn did something similar last December, *The Scrooge Run*. That run was an academy award winner and I expect this run will be of similar quality. In other words, don't miss it.

September's last event will be the Coronado Speed Fest on the 20th and 21st. Now it its 17th year, the Fleet Week Coronado Speed Festival is Fleet Week San Diego's marquee event. The event features fastpaced, thrilling vintage auto racing and exhibitions for car enthusiasts of all ages at one of the most distinctive race track locations — Naval Air Station North Island. New this year will be off-road truck racing. These versatile trucks race on virtually any surface, and are designed to take flight. Producing 600 horsepower, these V8 trucks generate speeds upwards of 130 miles per hour. Races feature manmade ramps set up in strategic locations throughout each course which allow the trucks to fly through the air nearly 20 feet off the ground and hundreds of feet down course.


