Grand (Canyon) Adventures in Miataland

n September 8, 12 people in 6 Miatas took off on a 6-day, 1,500+ mile adventure to the North Rim of the Grand Canyon (NRGC). Our goals were to safely make it there and back, stay off the Interstate highways as much as possible, eat well, and have fun with our Miata friends. We did all of that and much more.

We only planned one other Miata trip, served as sweep once, joined two multi-day (MRLS 25, Cambria) trips, and participated in about 30 local runs. We didn't have a lot to go on about planning such a 6-day trip. When in doubt, take the advice Jackie's dad used to give, "Fake 'til you make it." With that in mind, we went boldly forward, laughing at ourselves, which encourages others to go along just to see what happens. Along the Miata way, we learned four important things about our trip – planning, places, palates, and partnerships.

Planning. Planning our first long-distance, multi-day run was daunting -- so much to figure out and things to consider. We created detailed plans for routes, meals, lodging, sights, and "fascinating facts" along the way. While the planning was important, we learned that executing a longer trip is a balance between a well-laid plan and flexibility. Nearly everything went as planned or close to it, and yet we still found closed roads, discovered restaurants that didn't measure up, and timing that we misjudged. There was even one time in Jerome, AZ when the group simply rebelled. So, our plans morphed. A plan that can't be changed is a "rule," and too many rules don't contribute to "fun."

<u>Places</u>. We started our Grand Adventure from D'Carlo's in Ramona, through the mountains to Palm Desert, Twentynine Palms (note the missing hyphen, one of many "fascinating facts"), Amboy, Searchlight, and stopped for our first night at the Hoover Dam Lodge. A little gambling at the casino and a hole-in-the-wall barbeque place capped a pretty hard, long day of driving.

We began Day Two with a tour of Hoover Dam and learned that Ken Hurd is a dam enthusiast, no really! Between Ken and Daryled Bristol we learned a lot about dams and water. From the dam, we headed north on Lakeshore/Northshore Drive through Overton, Nevada. The first of several "oh sh_t" moments of "turn, turn right now", "oh wait, don't turn", "TURN!". We were glad that there were only five cars

following us. After a fine Mexican lunch at Ricardo's in St. George, Utah, we took the slow route through the unexpectedly beautiful Snow Canyon State Park, and continued on the blue highways to Cedar City where we spent the night. Who knew that Cedar City could have such a great pizza place as Centro Woodfired Pizza?

Day Three brought us beautiful skies and near-perfect temperatures as we climbed up the mountains, through beautiful Cedar Breaks National Monument, then on to Panguich, Utah, where we got a little taste of fall colors as the shimmering or quaking aspens had begun to change their leaves to a golden yellow. In the afternoon, we stopped in Kanab to visit the Little Hollywood Museum and Chuckwagon Dinner for an unexpected skit performed by French tourists and a movie. We don't want to spoil the fun, so let's just say, if you time it right, this place is a fun stop.

Finally, we approached the mid-point of our trip the North Rim of the Grand Canyon. What more is there to say about the Canyon beyond spectacular? The temperatures were perfect, the sunset and sunrise were remarkable, and our companions were kind, caring, and fun. No one was giddier with excitement than Grace Mills. Watching her reminded us to really stop and appreciate the splendor around us.



As we departed the North Rim on Day Four, we were treated with a herd of Bison on either side of the road and one particularly formidable bull standing in the middle, crosswise on the two-lane road acting as a crossing guard. Carlan Bristol snapped a cool pic. Thanks to Stacy and Ken Hurd who *actually* attended the evening ranger program, we learned that the House Rock Bison herd was part of a conservation effort by a former buffalo skinner. He cross-bred the herd with cattle, but later abandoned the project. The herd, which predominately lives in the Park now totals some 400-600 bison or would that be beefalo?"



Now back to the bull in the road. We stopped our cars and watched the bison. Every time an OTM would inch towards the bull, he'd stare the driver down. Instinctively, Jackie rolled up her window, yeah on her rag top. After a time and in response to some invisible signal, half the herd ran across the road. Jackie started inching forward before the last bison crossed. She was convinced that she was getting the evil eye. It was, as if, the two-bison crossing guard was saying, "You have GOT to be kidding. Don't you see that we are crossing here?" While notoriously bad tempered, the bison shared the road with us that day; no tourists were gored or Miatas rammed.

Once the bison gave way, we drove on through the Vermillion Cliffs and Marble Canyon. Lunch on the Navajo Reservation at Cameron Trading Post hit the



spot. While this is a tourist bus destination, the "Navajo Tacos" were worth it. We continued to make a loop to Wukapi and Sunset Crater National Monuments on our way to Flagstaff for the night.

From Flagstaff, we went south on Highway 89-A through Oak Creek Canyon, Sedona, and Cottonwood. Our stop in Jerome was a test in flexibility and patience. It is a cool little town, but not very accessible for people with limited mobility – after hours of driving our Miatas in the hot sun, we were all feeling a little mobility challenged. We went on to the Gold Hill Mine Museum, but found it a little wanting. A better name might have been a vehicle graveyard. However, George Watson did rescue a tortoise who flipped over while trying to escape his enclosure. We thought George was a hero.

We drove some very nice twisties into Prescott for a terrific lunch at El Gato Azul and a little shopping. (Prescott, by the way, is pronounced Pres-kit, like biscuit, in case you are ever talking to the Waids.) The

There's not much to say about the drive back through the desert through Brawley. It's hot, flat, and agricultural. But lunch in Julian at the Rongbranch was a treat. First time that NONE of us ordered pie.

Every place we went had its own beauty, and we were constantly reminded that we live in a stunningly beautiful country and we are grateful to be able to enjoy it with adventurous and kind souls with our tops down.

People. The scenery is the scenery and the food the food, but it's the people that make the trip. We were fortunate to have five Miatas, four of whom were experienced SDMC drivers and navigators. Their experience enhanced our enjoyment of the trip and deepened our friendship and respect for them and the car. As Daryled Bristol said in a posting, SDMC "Members from all walks of life come together to en-

joy these little under powered "sports cars". We probably cover every economic strata of western civilization, political, religious, and other interest you can possibly name and we meld into one heck of a cohesive group of adults playing with kids' toys and loving it." Like us, George and Elsa Watson are relatively new to the club and the car.

Palates. We confess that we may have gotten a little carried away in planning the meals on this trip -- okay Bob got carried away. As much as Steve loves people, Bob loves good food (and beer). We learned that not everyone likes food as spicy as Bob (duh). True to the adage that "SDMC is an eating club with a driving problem", we ate very well. This can lead to the Bob and Jackie show. Neal Mills thinks we need to be a two-Miata family. But really, what fun would that be! We love to laugh, have fun, travel, eat, experience new things, and share it with wonderful people and each other.

Carlan Bristol remarked, the North Rim Run was probably the longest, most relaxing, entertaining, informative event she could have hoped for. It was like when we were just kids and great days stretched into forever and yet seemed to end all too soon. We agree wholeheartedly. This trip, as they say, is in the books, but it already has us wondering where our next Miataland Adventure will take us?

Zoom Zoom! A Beginner's Perspective of a Run

was a new member of the San Diego Miata Club and my first run on May 1, 2016 was "Run Around the Hills", with run leaders Lonnie and Kaye Kerns. We departed Jamacha Rd. and Hwy 94 and enjoyed the twists, turns, hills, flatlands and scenic beauty for 114.7 miles. It was an exhilarating experience! It was my baptism into the challenging and seductive "sport" of runs! As a teenager, I had planned on becoming a professional race car driver however my parents informed me that they were not paying for 4 years of college so that I could drive race cars. So, for me, my first run combined the adventure of driving and the dreams I once had.

I have driven many more runs since that time and every run is as distinctive and exciting as my first run. A run is more than just a group of Miatas driving in a caravan. It's so much more than time, distance and motion! My physics professor would explain the runs as displacement—a vector representing a change in position, velocity, speed and distance. To determine the displacement of an object, identify the change in position between the starting and end point. If my physics professor went on a run he would explain it as lots of fun! My fellow drivers take to the road with wild abandon but for me to be successful in displacement, I conquer the twists and turns with steely determination and steadfast focus. I envision an imaginary towrope linking my car to the Miata in front of me.

The displacement process is what makes a run a run. And each run has its own personality with its foundation being meticulous planning that is selflessly done by several SDMC members. It evolves from concept to creation.



SDMC members arrive in their SDMC attire. They speak another language--the "language of the runs." It is quite unique-- sweep, queue up spot, OTM, magnetics, comfort stop, navigator and CBs (seriously? like the "truckers" use?!). But above all, the extraordinary participants—drivers and their navigators--in the run are the most impressive. The Miatas assemble at the meeting place—all models and colors--each reflective of the driver's style. The coveted set of magnetics is presented to leaders on their first run. Those who have been awarded magnetics proudly display them on their Miata. From the very minute of my first run, it was my goal to lead a run! I was able to achieve that goal in June, 2017 with Run to the Rainbow.

On the runs there is a synergy and sense of excitement in the air. Everyone is encouraging. Although from the moment we begin to roll everyone looks out for the other drivers, there seems to be a slight edge of competitiveness as cars often vie for position. The sweep makes sure that no one is left behind. (After the Angeles Crest run I was one of the 4-5 cars that headed back to the 15 along the Crest. Concerned that I was driving a bit too slow, I told Gene, the sweep, that he should go ahead with the other drivers. Despite my insistence, he would hear nothing of it—testimony to his commitment).

At either a midpoint or the end of the run, the group rolls into a restaurant specifically chosen where the food is delicious. There's a spirit of camaraderie created in part by the sense of accomplishment and fulfilment from another great run. The restaurants are not run of the mill franchise locations but rather places that have generous portions, great food and reasonable prices. Oh, and by the way, the restaurant must survive the arrival of 30-50 hungry people at the same time!

You may have heard the expression that it's not the destination that's important, it's the journey. No truer words could be spoken of a run.

I have more driving skills to learn, lots of practice still is needed and many more runs to do both! Although I did not become a professional race car driver, I sure feel like one when I drive a run! What a feeling! Zoom zoom!


