30th Anniversary 2019 Miata Introduced in Chicago

A limited edition 30th Anniversary 2019 Miata has been introduced at the Chicago Auto Show.



It was the Chicago Auto Show in 1989 where the Miata was first introduced to the motoring public.

The color is called **Racing Orange**. The 30th Anniversary edition includes **orange** brake calipers, Alcantara interior with **orange** piping on the Recaro seats, **orange** dashboard, shifter, and door trims, 17 inch Ray's wheels, Bil-

stein shocks and a limited slip differential for the manual models, some upgraded electronic enhancements in the interior and a 30th anniversary badge on the left quarter panel.



It will be available in both soft-top and RF models. There will be only 500 models coming to the US. The pre-order for the US allocation is **already sold out**. (300 soft tops, 200 RF's.)

Goin' Green

Since I should already be "doing penance" for spending so much time and newsletter space on the subject of vehicle color, what harm can it do taking just one more swing at the topic? I'm not Irish, and don't pretend to be on St. Patrick's Day, soon upon us. (That would be the "wearin' of the green" vs. "going green," -O'Ed.) My being "ethnic authentic" extends to avoiding green beer as well, but the truth is I like certain shades of green. Ford's Mustang had a pastel metallic green a few model years ago (now Ford has a 2019 Bullitt Mustang in Bullitt green-Ed.), and Lamborghini has an inyour-face lime green I've always been fond of ... both colors would be perfectly at home on a Miata.

I'm decidedly not one of those that think green is an unlucky color to display on one's vehicle, and especially not on a race car. "Going green" is synonymous with taking better care of our environment, and often applies to our modes of transportation. It's a cultural buzz word and, among other things, has become the rallying cry for proponents of allelectric and hybrid electric vehicles. For now at least, the claim of "zero emissions" vehicles remains the "pot of gold at the end of the rainbow" - less than 40% of our generation of electric power derives from nuclear and renewable sources – hydro-electric, solar, etc. Clearly, fossil fuels still account for the majority of our

power. My beef (as a food source, it's another target of certain "going green" initiatives) with electric cars has more to do with their general lack of personality and an engaging driving experience. They're computers on wheels, *I tell ya.* I prefer a much simpler machine, but even I have limits. For example, member Dell Pound has enjoyed a succession of Model T Fords – *most* of the way toward the other end of the automotive continuum.

As is widely-understood, Amish (especially "Old Order") culture eschews most modern conveniences, including automobiles. Seemingly content to commute in horse-drawn buggies and carriages, they add an interesting twist to the phrase "going green." Manure, as a by-product of equine power generation (and roughly 50 pounds per day), is typically a shade of "green," though certainly not a good color for your Miata. Disgusted, but still curious? The healthy green color results from a diet high in alfalfa, as opposed to dry grass hay.

The weather was pretty forgiving at least one Saturday in February. It was off to K1 Speed in the morning (also long overdue for yours truly), then over to the BMW Autocross sessions at SDCCU Stadium, after a hamburger lunch with the gang at nearby Mish-Mash Burgers. The impetus was to see how well the low-bucks race car, a used silver NC, would perform at autocross. Goodwin Racing had executed their latest project car at the behest of Grassroots Motorsports; in turn, it was documented in their magazine. To be fair, Walter "Rocky" Murphy (any doubts about his Irish lineage?) supplied the vast majority of the wrenching, and centered upon the installation of a torquier 2.5 liter four cylinder plucked from a salvaged Mazda 6. Since the donor vehicle sustained a heavy rearend impact, Greg Lee concluded it likely wasn't being driven very hard. (Isn't that a bit of "pretzel logic?" – Ed.)


